### 8/12 Raptor's Toy Ride

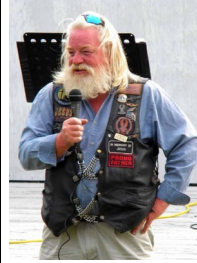
